

What the Heart Knows by Mara Purl

Mara Purl, actress-turned-author, has offered this story both as a radio drama for BBC Radio and a paperback under a small press. She's now offering the Milford-Haven series for the first time in hardcover. What the Heart Knows is the first book in the series.

In the early chapters of the book, I felt like I was walking on to the set of General Hospital or The Young and the Restless. Just like the soaps, each character is being drawn out and readers become sucked into the middle of the drama comprising the landscape of Milford-Haven.

We first meet Christine Christian, a reporter, digging into a story about a new mansion and whether or not the builder is

meeting environmental regulations for the building. Christine meets her untimely death by one of the men who works on the house; you soon realize he works for more than Jack.

We are also introduced to Jack Sawyer, who's the premier contractor/builder in Milford-Haven and who has a past (and an unknown child) with Samantha Hugo, director of the town's Environmental Planning Commission. Samantha's best friend, who is also the main character of the Milford-Haven novels, artist Miranda Jones, is pursued by oil magnet Zack Calvin for her art and possibly more.

Then there's Sally, owner of the local restaurant, who's having a secret affair with Jack. She is a girl with southern roots, but she is one tough cookie.

These are just some of the main characters Mara introduces in What the Heart Knows. While the story is a great series opening, there are more things left unresolved, which I'm not a big fan of; however any soap opera fan will attest to the importance of a cliffhanger ending. To see what happens to the residents of Milford-Haven next, readers will just have to wait for the next book in the series, Where the Heart Lives, scheduled for spring of 2012.
