



Lives. So the most natural form of writing for me was dialogue. Early drafts of my first novel was, in fact, mostly dialogue! I had to learn a lot before I mastered narrative voice. I'm still grateful dialogue comes as naturally as it does. I want to be sure the reader can *hear* my character's voices.

The other great thing I learned from writing for film and television is the importance of visuals. It's important to me that my reader can *see* exactly where the action is taking place. Particularly in my genre, women's fiction, rich visual detail is important.

TNC: Who are your favorite authors?

MP: Jane Austen, who created the first true "inner voice" in MIT Jaie Auster, who treated the first true linter voice in fiction; Charles Dickens, the master of serial story-telling; Lady Murasaki, who penned the world's first novel, *Tale of Genji*. In terms of contemporaries, I have many favorites! And I try to arrange to do joint book events with as many of them as possible.

TNC: Do you have any advice for the aspiring writer?

MP: I am so fortunate to have had several extraordinary mentors, and I still try to heed their advice. One mentor was Louis L'Amour, and one big piece of advice from him was to write consistently, even write almost constantly.

From both Louis and from James Michener, for whom I apprenticed in college, I learned the importance of research, which is the entire foundation of all my novels.

From my own experience, I'd recommend a writer begin by looking for what I call a "gap"—a zone as yet undiscovered by other writers. Tony Hillerman writes about the Navajo; Linda Fairstein writes about the New York City District Attorney's office; I write about California's Central Coast. Choose a location and/or a topic about which you feel passionate and are likely never to get bored.

Then \ldots start writing and keep the flow going. Put in the hours. That's the only path to mastery.

There you have it, dear readers! I truly enjoyed this interview as Mara Purl is a pleasure to work with and has some awesome advice for us aspiring writers!
